#### **ENGAGE**

Directly engage over 21,000 policymakers, practitioners, and other stakeholders in a wide range of training activities, policy discussions, and strategic consultations.



#### **SUPPORT**

Provide funding and support to 36 grassroots civil society organizations leading localized conflict prevention initiatives in Bangladesh, Indonesia, Philippines, Pakistan, Malaysia, Cameroon, Burkina Faso, Togo, Ivory Coast, Ghana, Mozambique, Uganda, Tanzania, and Kenya.



#### **PROMOTE**

Successfully **promote human rights language in UN resolutions** to address the misuse and abuse of counterterrorism measures that stymie peaceful protests, impede humanitarian aid, and shrink civic space.



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## THE GLOBAL CENTER'S IMPACT AROUND THE WORLD

### **OUR WORK**



The Global Center works with our partners around the world to build more resilient communities so that they are better equipped to address rising violence.



We strengthen justice institutions like judiciaries, prison systems, and police services to improve their handling of terrorism cases and ensure rights and freedoms are protected.



The Global Center works with the private sector and governments to build transparent and accountable systems that curb terrorism and other illicit financing.



We advise governments and international organizations like the United Nations to place transparency and accountability at the center of their multilateral security efforts.

#### THE BALKANS

In North Macedonia and Albania, our programs strengthen anti-money laundering and countering the financing of terrorism policy frameworks and investigations in collaboration with government, private sector, and regulatory bodies. This includes raising awareness among the private sector around terrorism financing risks and obligations.

#### THE MIDDLE EAST AND NORTH AFRICA

In the Maghreb, we coordinate a vibrant network of researchers, journalists, and experts monitoring security-related trends in the region. We have longstanding programming with the national prison system of Morocco, through which we have trained its entire staff to address violent extremism in prisons.

#### **SOUTH AND SOUTHEAST ASIA**

Across South and Southeast Asia, we work to enhance border security with a view to preventing foreign terrorist fighter travel. We support the Strong Cities Network in the region, engaging municipal governments and civic leaders across Indonesia and the Philippines to collaborate around combatting violent extremism at the local level.

#### **WEST AND CENTRAL AFRICA**

We have long been active in the Sahel, including partnering with chief justices in the region to harmonize their legal responses to terrorism cases with international human rights standards. In Cameroon, we work to strengthen good governance and access to justice to manage the threats posed by Boko Haram today and prevent future violence.

#### **EASTERN AND SOUTHERN AFRICA**

Through our office in Nairobi, we support local organizations working to safeguard civic space, human rights, and humanitarian action across the region. We manage a country-wide program with the Kenyan prison service to address violent extremism in prisons, training all 30,000 prison officers. Our internationally recognized work on countering the financing of terrorism includes multiyear programs with Djibouti, Ethiopia, Kenya, Mozambique, Somalia, Tanzania, and Uganda.



We directly engaged over 21,000 policymakers, practitioners, and other stakeholders in a wide range of training activities, policy discussions, and strategic consultations.

We managed more than \$5 million in programs globally, working closely together with local partners. We disbursed **over** \$800,000 in funding

directly to 36 local organizations across 14 countries, including grassroots women and youth networks and human rights groups.

#### 97% of our funders

have reinvested in our work as we deliver real and measurable change.

## **SUCCESS STORIES**

## **EXPANDING THE STRONG CITIES NETWORK**

Since 2015, the Global Center has been supporting the Strong Cities Network (SCN), a network of mayors and other local authorities dedicated to improving efforts to counter violent extremism, hate, and polarization in their communities.

Over the last year, as a result of the Global Center's efforts in Southeast Asia, the SCN 1) welcomed the Indonesian cities of Surabaya and Surakarta to the network; 2) fostered new partnerships brokered by the Global Center between grassroots actors and local governments to ensure a societal approach to addressing violent extremism; and 3) facilitated the sharing of experiences among national, regional, and local authorities in Indonesia to improve national-local cooperation to prevent and counter violent extremism.




# SUPPORTING PRISON AUTHORITIES IN KENYA

As part of our efforts to improve the human rights compliant management and rehabilitation of violent extremist offenders in Kenya, over 19,000 prison staff were trained in 2022, including 15,197 staff and 4,044 new recruits.

Subsequent phases will see the training of the remaining 11,000 prison officers in the country, institutionalization of the course in the training college, and deployment of an advance course to further train the 900 officers managing terrorism-related prisoners at 25 of Kenya's high security prisons.

The project also involves a civil society oversight component to strengthen accountability mechanisms in prisons in partnership with the Kenya Prisons Service and National Counter Terrorism Centre.
